Tasmanian Schooling History

Following on from our last '150 Years of Education' series we look at Flora Wesley.

The 26-year-old Flora Wesley had been living in the colony for 9 years when she applied for her first teaching position in 1894. At the time Flora had no teaching experience and her most recent employment history was for a Hatmaker. With flattering references from upstanding Individuals, Flora's application was accepted. What is fascinating with these character references is their emphasis on Miss Wesley's character, very little is said about her teaching ability.

Miss Wesley's application was accepted, and she subsequently passed her entrance exam held in January 1895. Flora's first appointment was at Barton School, Campbell Town in 1896.

In 1901 Flora moved to teach at Lady Bay, in Southport, where she spent for 5 years. In that time she had sent multiple requests to the Minister of Education requesting a posting at a 'town school'. It seems these requests to move to more populous areas may be due to the nature of small tows. Miss Wesley was quoted saying, 'By the time several of the leading residents have picked at the teacher, there is very little left of her except her bare bones.'

Two years later, she was still at Lady Bay, and although she was still keen for a transfer, there were some schools that she was hesitant to go to, especially Ouse School.

The last letter in her file is from March 1904 to School Inspector Lovell confirming that she has been appointed teacher in charge of Hythe, later Southport. She was still there in

Road Safety Week 2020

An average of 30 people are killed and 270 are seriously injured on Tasmania's roads each year. If that number of people were killed or injured at the same time, there would be an outcry. Our community should not accept that death and injury on the roads is inevitable. The Road Safety Advisory Council's vision is to have no road crash fatalities or serious injuries.

Public education is an important part of working towards that vision. And Road Safety Week is a key part of that education. The Week was postponed this year from the usual time of the first week of May, because of the COVID-19 emergency, to 15 November to 22 November.

The Week is an initiative of the Safer Australian Roads and Highways (SARAH) Group that partners with the governments and road safety organisations, including Tasmania's Road Safety Advisory Council. The Week is an opportunity to urge people to 'drive so others survive' and to highlight the impact of road trauma and how to reduce it.

On the 16th of September TASSO held its annual general meeting at various locations around the state. We had an exceptional turnout and for the first, in recent times the meeting met a quorum and the event did not have to be postponed.

It was a successful night with two of the three motions presented passing. The major one for us was a brand new constitution to replace the heavily aged document we have been using for years.

This was a major project that Debra, (the Manager here at TASSO) practically took on alone. We were lucky enough to secure the help of a generous law firm whom for no cost ensured that all the work was legally sound.

The new constitution will allow TASSO to operate more efficiently and conform with all modern standards.

Our other highlight was a few extra faces that have shown significant interest in TASSO and I'm glad to say they have continued to be in touch. We also have a brand new board member in Neil Myers, which we are thrilled about.

A few weeks later we held our induction day to formalise the Board Members' positions and outline TASSO's expectations. Once the formalities were over with the planning for the year ahead began.

NAPLAN

Last the external review into NAPLAN.

The report, which has been compiled over the last 12 months, explores the worthiness of NAPLAN, where it shines and what needs to change.

It also includes a lot of statistics which may be of interest to parents, bearing in mind of course, its not a perfect model.

The authors stated,

'We have concluded that standardised assessment is important in Australian education and that it serves a variety of purposes. We have recommended the retention of some important features of NAPLAN but recommended, as well, some important changes to content, psychometric properties, timing of the assessments within the year and over the Years of schooling.

We commend our final report to you and trust that it will provide a useful platform for a revitalised Australian National Standardised Assessment.'
