

Information Sessions explained

As the peak body for Tasmanian Associations of State School Organisations, we are hosting a range of networking events, workshops, information sessions and engagement activities to best support the members of School Association Committees throughout Tasmania.

Consider joining your School **Association Committees**

School Associations are central to every Tasmanian state school, and their committees help strengthen connections between families, staff, and the wider community. This session introduces what a School Association Committee (SAC) is, why they matter, and how you can get involved.

Participants will gain an understanding of the structure and responsibilities of SACs under the Education Act 2016, including governance, decision-making, and supporting school initiatives. We will outline how to nominate for a committee role, what to expect once you join, and the different ways you can contribute; as a member, office bearer, sub-committee participant, or event volunteer.

We will also explore the personal and community benefits of joining your SAC: building relationships, learning new skills, and helping improve outcomes for students. By the end of the session, you will have a clear picture of how SACs operate, the rewarding opportunities they provide, and the practical steps to get involved in your school's committee.

School Association Committee Fundraising Session

Fundraising plays a vital role in supporting school initiatives and enhancing student experiences.

This session will guide School Association Committees through effective fundraising strategies, planning, and compliance with relevant policies and regulations. Learn how to engage your school community, set achievable goals, and run successful events that align with your school's values.

School Association Committee Committee Roles Session

A well-functioning School Association Committee relies on clear roles, shared responsibilities, and strong collaboration.

This session will outline the key roles within a committee; such as Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and general members; and explain their responsibilities, expectations, and how they contribute to effective governance.

School Association Committee Introduction to the Model Constitution

The School Association Committee Model Constitution sets the framework for how School Associations in Tasmania operate, outlining the rules, responsibilities, and powers that guide committees in their governance role.

This session introduces the Model Constitution in a clear and practical way, helping members understand what it means for their committee and how it shapes decision-making.

Participants will explore the key elements of the Model Constitution, including committee membership and structure, roles of office bearers, meeting requirements, and the responsibilities of members. The session will also highlight the functions and powers of School Associations under the Education Act 2016, from contributing to school policy and planning, to fundraising and community engagement.

We will unpack what Principals are required to provide to the committee and clarify boundaries between governance and day-today school management. By the end, participants will have a clear understanding of how the Model Constitution supports effective, transparent, and collaborative School Association Committees, and where to find resources to guide their ongoing work.

School Association Committee Volunteer Engagement Session

Volunteers are the heart of every successful School Association.

This session focuses on how to attract, engage, and retain volunteers to support your school's goals. Learn practical strategies for building a welcoming culture, recognising contributions, and matching people's skills with meaningful opportunities using TASSOs resource: Volunteer Engagement Resource Guide.

School Association Committee Financials and Risk Session

Sound financial management and risk awareness are essential for the success and integrity of School Association Committees.

This session will cover the fundamentals of managing committee finances, including budgeting, reporting, and compliance with relevant policies. School Association Committee Risk Smart - Strengthening Your School **Association Committee**

TASSO invites all School Association Committee (SAC) members to join our interactive Risk Smart workshop – a practical session designed to help you better understand, plan for, and manage risk in your committee's activities.

Whether you are organising a school disco, coordinating a raffle, or leading a major fundraiser, knowing how to identify and reduce risks is essential. This 90-minute to 2-hour session (delivered online or in-person) will walk you through key risks facing SACs, outline a simple 5-step risk management process, and guide you in developing your own Risk Register.

- An Annual Risk Review Planner

Learn how to protect your school community, support safe volunteering, and feel confident in your SAC role.

School Association Committee Grant Writing Foundations Session

School Association Committee Advocating for your School Association Session

Advocacy is a powerful way for School Associations to influence positive change for students, families, and school communities.

This session introduces a simple, repeatable advocacy cycle tailored for School Association Committees. Learn how to define issues clearly, gather evidence, map allies, and engage decision-makers respectfully and effectively. We will also explore how to stay apolitical while working alongside your principal, raise your collective voice, and contribute to processes such as the State Government's Budget Priority Submission.
